

ENGRAFTING THE WORD OF GOD

Wherefore lay apart all filthiness and superfluity of naughtiness, and receive with meekness the engrafted word, which is able to save your souls.

James 1:21 KJV

Engraft means "to invigorate (fill with life or energy; or to strengthen) by instruction. A good example of engrafting is fruit trees. Many times, farmers will graft together a root system and a healthy young shoot, so that the resulting tree will bear the fruit of the engrafted portion and not of the root portion.

God commands us to lay up, or place, His words in our hearts. Deuteronomy 11:18 says, "Therefore shall ye lay up these my words in your heart and in your soul, and bind them for a sign upon your hand, that they may be as frontlets between your eyes". We do this by hearing the word of God, believing HIs word, and applying His word by the way we live.

Engrafting truth is the process of attaching the Word to the diseased part of the soul. Whether it be anger, bitterness, fear, or doubt, the healing qualities of God's word can restore those parts of our soul. This only happens if it is applied, or laid up, consistently over those areas of our lives.

In practice, God's word purifies our hearts through the Spirit and the engrafted word can do so many good things for our lives! It can:

- Help us to love with a pure heart: 1 Peter 1:11 says, "Beloved let us love one another...". The Word helps to transform the way we think, cleanses our minds, and separates us from worldly philosophies, and allows us to love one another as Christ loved us.
- Establish God's righteousness: As we speak, live, and promote the laws of the Lord, we take stand against those things which are contrary to God's word.
- **Build faith:** Ezekiel 20:19 says, "I am the Lord your God; walk in my statues, and keep my judgements, and do them". All the promises of God are dependent on your faith in God's word. Faith makes you believe it, and believing moves you to live it, all through the power of the engrafted word!
- Encourage and strengthen us: The engrafted Word gives us strength to act upon our convictions, a foundation to stand upon when the trials come and the confidence to fight the forces of darkness. Romans 8:37 says, "No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through Him that loved us.". Through the engrafted Word, we KNOW that we are more than conquerors
- Impart spiritual authority: Proverbs 28:1 says, "For the wicked flee when no man puruseth, but the righteous are as bold as a lion." As we stand upon the engrafted Word, we obtain promises. We will be delivered from forces of darkness, we will be advocates for God's justice and righteous judgement as we speak with God's authority.

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FROM TERROR TO TRIUMPH

October 20, 2021, I was sent home from work, Covid positive, following a routine check. I was frustrated that I was sent home from work feeling fine. I was so sure that the test was wrong.

...but

That same evening I picked up a fever. Covid spread rapidly though the home. My wife kept track of our symptoms daily, and it is with her help I write this story.

The first seven days I was home, I had typical Covid symptoms. I would take

ibuprofen, it would help, and I would work around the house, feeling fine. Fever kept coming back daily, fatigue and cough were worsening. Finally, I told my wife I thought I might have pneumonia, and she urged me to get checked out, thinking I probably needed an antibiotic.

I arrived at the emergency room in Presque Isle on Wednesday, October 27, 2021, so exhausted I could hardly walk. My O2 was 74%, and my admitting diagnosis was advanced Covid. Neither my wife nor I had any idea I was so sick. They told me they were admitting me, and I would probably be there for a couple weeks recovering.

By the 30th, Josh was in the Covid ICU. I received a call from the nurse saying he was not doing well. He was requiring a lot of oxygen, he needed pressure to help push the air into his lungs, some of his stats were very high. He was on two medications to treat Covid, and they had found small holes in his bowel, which complicated things. I broke down and cried that day when I called our Pastor, Bro. Doughty. For the first time, I realized he might not make it.

The next couple days were touch and go. He would improve a little bit, which meant sometimes he could handle breathing without added oxygen for a minute or two. He had a harsh, wracking cough, they had to give him Lasiks to drain the fluid he was retaining, they put him on steroids. We had many people praying at this point. They thought about

sending him to Bangor. His D-Dimer, which indicates blood clots basically, was still climbing.

I received a call from my wife Tuesday, November 2, telling me my best friend had just dropped dead at 37 years old. She didn't want to tell me, but it was on Facebook and she knew I had been checking it. It was too much for me. *It was*

very tough to tell Josh about his friend, but I knew he wouldn't forgive me if I didn't tell him. In his weakened condition, it was too much. He took a nose dive.

They told me I needed to be intubated if I had any hope. I was

scared. My wife reminded me God wasn't stopped by a tube, but I had to say, "Ok, I'm yours, Lord." It wasn't easy realizing I might never see my family again. I was facing death.

Josh was intubated on the 4th, as a last resort to try and save his life. It took them four hours to stabilize him. On this day I was at the funeral home helping to plan our friend's funeral. Stress was an understatement. But God is good, and circumstances do not change Him.

The next few days were rough. Having a funeral, being a support, wondering if the next funeral would be my husband, unable to tell him anything, wishing I had never gotten irritated with him, etc. He started vomiting, even while unconscious on the vent, they kept turning him trying to get the excess fluid to drain off. He had fevers continuing, which had not left since day one. They packed him in ice, pumped him with antibiotics, they tried anti-fungal treatment. They were seeing signs that indicated he may have swelling in the brain, but he was too sick to check. They said he would probably need to be sent to Bangor and have a tracheostomy.

On the 16th, they said I could come see him. I asked the nurse, "Is it because I may never see him alive again?" The nurse said, "Yes, ma'am." I went into his room, and I prayed, I sang, I called our pastor and put it on speaker phone while he prayed, I called our children and let him hear their Continued on page 5.

voices. I was brave, but it was very tough to see him alone, knowing that without a miracle, I was a widow.

When Josh arrived in Bangor, he was too critical for a trach. They normally don't have a breathing tube down a throat for more than two weeks. Josh had it for four weeks. Most people in the same situation as Josh, never regain their voice. In Bangor, it was still touch and go. He was still spiking fevers, they were doing CT scans of his entire body trying to find the problem. When he stabilized, they started trying to wake him from the vent. He wasn't waking properly. His head would thrash from side to side, and his blood pressure would skyrocket. On November 30th, they did the tracheostomy. By December 1, he was finally Covid negative. I was able to see him on the 3rd.

The rest of the story is just details, for which there isn't time. Bro. Stoops came and prayed for me more than once. He told me something happened on the 15th. I began to improve by leaps and bounds. They were all shocked. I knew details, events, places. I was more observant than I had been in a long time. Bangor said I was the 3rd person to ever survive that severe of a situation, and I was the only one Presque Isle had ever seen.

There has been so much left unsaid in this story. God is a good God, and I am the recipient of many miracles. Most people do not realize how severe and how helpless my situation was. They did not expect me to make it. But God!

It had been a long day and the little boy had never seen so many people in one place before! He had listened intently as the man they called Jesus taught and watched with wide eyes as he saw lame people walking and blind people receiving their sight! It was incredible!

As the afternoon wore on a murmur began to spread through the crowd. People were hungry. His belly too began to rumble, and he was glad his mother had packed him a little lunch for the day. Just before he dug into his food, there was a commotion off to his right. Through the mass of people, he could make out some of the men that

accompanied Jesus moving through and talking with families. As they approached, he could hear their question, "Any food at all?".

The boy looked down at his pack and his first thought was to wrap his food back up and move somewhere more private. What would his meager snack mean in the face of so many anyway? But then something, or someone, spoke to him. A voice that seemed to stir something in his heart and his mind at the same time. The soft yet strong melodic voice simply said, "Offer what you have." At that moment the shadows of Jesus' disciples spilled over the five small loves and two little fishes in the boy's lap. The boy picked up his head and met their gaze. He lifted his hands and offered the lunch, such as it was, to them.

It was not a seasoned pastor or an experienced missionary nor was it an educated long-standing saint that offered up what they had, it was a lad, a child. A child's faith is pure because it has yet to be influenced by the harsh realities that so often cause adults to temper their faith in an almighty God. Rev. Douglas M. Hooper, 64, of Lubec, on April 17, 2022, at Mass General Hospital, peacefully left his earthly vessel to transition to his heavenly home surrounded by his loving family. He was born on, July 22, 1957, in Lubec,

Maine, the son of Colby and Wilma Hooper.

In 1979, He married the love of his life, Roberta. In the past 42 years, Doug has created great memories with Bobby. Doug loved to serenade Bobby while playing one of his many instruments and the songs he had written just for her. Doug was well known for his practical jokes, could fill a room with laughter, and no one was a stranger; just a friend he had not met. For over 20 years, Doug served on the security team at the Cutler Navy Base.

He had a love of painting. One of his masterpieces was hand delivered to Former President Bush and is displayed at his home here in Maine. You may have had a privilege to hear Doug on his gospel radio station.

Most of all, Doug had a love for his Savior. In 2013, he opened the doors to Down East Faith Tabernacle where he had a great compassion for people and a desire to tell people of God's love. Doug will be greatly missed by his wife, Roberta and his faithful companion, Lady Bell; his mother, Wilma; sisters, Elaine and her husband, Willie, and Sue and her husband, David; brother, Byron; nieces and grandnieces; as well as his stepchildren, Joe and his special friend, Annmarie and her husband, Victor, along with three step granddaughters. Doug was predeceased by his father, Colby Hooper.

Bro Hooper attended Campobello where he got baptized and attended as a young boy with his family. He did not stay in church; he was in several rock bands that he started. He left that life to answer the call of God. He attended and later assisted under Bro McQuire. Later, he began to sit under Bro. Charles Hurst who helped him obtain is UPCI ministerial license. He also assisted Bro. Hurst in

Calais, Bro. Denzil Channell in Machias, as well as being a church planter in Lubec. He operated an online gospel radio station. He sang, played, and cut several CDs. It did not matter what the weather or his health condition, he baptized many at the beach. When his health would not allow him to stand and preach, he would teach a Bible Study live from his kitchen table. At one time, he could barely get off the couch, but he would always proclaim, "God is so good." When anybody would FaceTime with him in the ICU, he would say, "God is so good!" The last time we talked to him Saturday night in ICU he was planning the next step for Down East Faith Tabernacle.

After his funeral, a story was shared of how he impacted Wesley Powell. Wesley Powell has known the Hooper family since he was a born. When Wesley was a baby, Sister Hooper used to hold him in the ambulance while transporting him to the hospital. Sis. Hooper said Wesley was three months old, and even though she wasn't in church, she prayed the entire way that he would not die. During the time Bro. & Sis. Hooper assisted Keys to Life Tabernacle in Calais, Wesley attended many services with them. During Bro. Hooper's funeral he felt the need to be baptized. He contacted Sis Hooper Thursday night, asking to be baptized. Sunday, May 1, at 3 PM. Bro Steven Beauregard, along with Bro. Rodney Dame, baptized Wesley at the Lubec Boat ramp for the remission of his sins and taking on the name of Jesus Christ. Upon hearing this prayer during the baptism, one elderly gentleman stated he didn't realize the significance of baptism and requested to be baptized at a later date when the weather is warmer. Twelve people attended the baptism. That night, 11 were in church attendance and one committed to a Bible Study.

A lot of people knew Bro. Hooper, and he was well loved in the community. He requested Bro. Beauregard to make sure his funeral was a full church service with the Acts 2:38 message. Every minister that spoke mentioned the plan of salvation. God's presence filled the church as Bro. Dame led songs and while Bro. Stoops sang *Peace*, *Peace*, *Wonderful Peace* at the closing. The pastor there said he had never felt anything like that before. God works in mysterious ways, His wonders to perform! We believe a harvest will be reaped quickly in this last day as a result of the work Bro. Hooper did while he was here.

Finally, through the engrafted Word we find the favor of God and man. We read in Proverbs 3:1-4, "...Forget not my law; but let thine heart keep my commandments; for length of days and long life, and peace, shall they add to thee. Let not mercy and truth forsake thee: bind them about thy neck; write them upon the table of thine heart. So shalt thou find favor and good understanding in the sight of God and man."

Like the fruit tree bears the fruit of the engrafted portion, when we engraft the Word of God in our lives, we are able to bear the fruit of it. We love those around us with a pure heart, we are able to walk in righteousness and faith, we are strengthened daily by the Word, we have spiritual authority, and we find favor in the eyes of God and man.

Let's all take some time to make a daily habit of reading and memorizing the Word, so that it may be engrafted in our lives and that we may be able to bear the fruit of it and be a shining light of love, strength, and faith to our darkened world.

"Too long, too far, and too low." Those words have stuck with me ever since I read them in a story about Manfred von Richthofen ("The Red Baron").

The day was April 21, 1918. Richthofen led his flight of triplanes to search for British observation aircraft. An engagement ensued between a flight of Sopwith Camels led by Canadian Royal Air Force pilot Capt. Arthur Roy Brown. Brown's friend Lt. Wilfred May was a rookie on his first offensive patrol. May had been ordered to keep out of combat but couldn't resist. He jammed his guns and, defenseless, headed away from the battle. Richthofen spotted the lone plane and chose it for kill number 81. Brown observed the scene below him and dove to help his fellow airman, knowing that May was no match for Richthofen. Read what happens next, "It was then, with Brown closing from behind, that Richthofen, usually a meticulous and disciplined fighter pilot, made a mistake and broke one of his own rules by following May too long, too far, and too low into enemy territory. Two miles behind the Allied lines, as Brown caught up with Richthofen and fired, the chase passed over the machine-gun nests of Australian Field Artillery." The debate continues

over who fired the fatal shot that passed through Richthofen's torso. Ultimately it doesn't matter—whether hit from the air or the ground, The Red Baron was mortally wounded.

Richthofen was good. Probably over-confident. But he "broke one of the rules." Maybe in his mind he was just stretching the rule a bit. Or he was distracted by something that appeared too good to be true. Whatever the case, he compromised his standards, which led to his demise. For the Red Baron, the temptation of number 81 was too much to handle.

The temptation always exists for us to focus on the wrong things, forget where you are, and who's we are, and stretch, or compromise, God's rules, even our own rules. It is easy to be distracted. There are always new gimmicks that will try to lure us away from our first love. You are a target of the enemy. Don't lose your primary focus. Keep the main thing the main thing. "Fix your thoughts on Jesus" (Heb. 3:1, NIV). The main thing is to keep God's word the main thing in our lives.
