DIVINE INTENTIONS

Intention, or the thought or plan behind an action, can be a tricky thing for us as people to understand. Whether it be words, or actions, sometimes the things that we intend to convey can be misunderstood. Even the kindest gesture with the best thought behind it can be misconstrued. Unfortunately, this leads us to mistrust the intentions of other people, and even sometimes the intentions that we think God has in mind. However, with God, we can trust that His intentions are always good.

Jeremiah 29:11 says - "For I know the thoughts I think toward you, saith the Lord, thoughts of peace, and not of evil, to give you an expected end."

All of humanity is under His gaze and especially His people are under His watch. He knows the way that we take by the choices we make and the spirit we possess. He knows the purpose, the plan, and the progress of us all and His INTENTIONS are good! Sometimes the only consolation within our test is that His gaze is on us.

Sometimes when we are going through a test or trial, the intention does not feel good, or like the thoughts that God is having toward us are those of peace. Imagine being Joseph! God gave him dreams of the future, and his brothers despised him for it. He was sold into slavery, wrongly accused, thrown into jail, and even one of the men he was in jail with was killed. He had every reason to think that God's intentions were of evil and not of peace. He didn't have the reassurance of Jeremiah 29:11, but he did have his faith.

If we stopped reading Joseph's story around the time that Joseph was in the pit, we might be tempted to disregard the message in Jeremiah. We might think... there's no way that all of these things have a positive thought behind them. However, we continue to read through the story, and most of us know it by heart, and we know that in the end, Joseph's trials ended up being for the benefit of not only him, but nations!

This is what Jeremiah was conveying when he penned his letter to "...The residue of the elders which were carried away captives, and to the priests, and to the prophets, and to all the people whom Nebuchadnezzar had carried away captive from Jerusalem to Babylon;". This letter penned from Jeremiah, was an encouragement to the people who had been taken from their homes, held captive, and not given much hope for their future. But God said "I know the thoughts I think toward you... thoughts of peace, and not to evil...".

When we are moving through our walk with God, we are going to face things, whether it be a trial sent directly from God or it is something that is allowed as a distraction. It is easy to get discouraged and think that God's favor has moved from us and that we are no longer under His watch. We begin to doubt that His intentions remain good toward us. It is something that we must continue to remind ourselves that no matter the test or trial, God's intentions remain those of peace and an expected end.

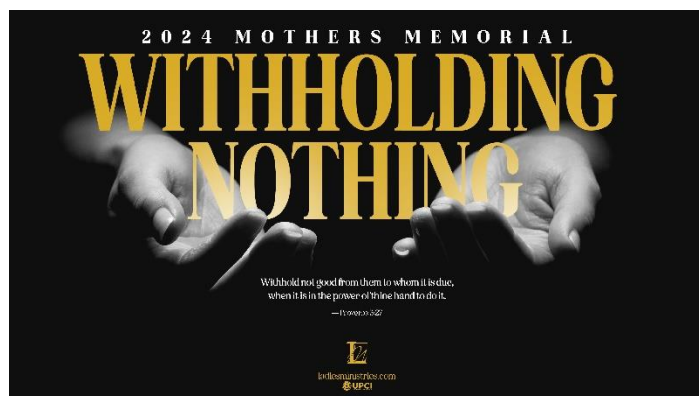

Edith Rutledge Stoops, 101 years, 10 months, 3 weeks, and 6 days of age, went to Heaven on Wednesday, August 30, 2023. She was born Oct. 3, 1921, the daughter of Llewellyn O. and Rose Day Rutledge, in Roodhouse, Illinois.

She earned a Bachelor of Arts Degree in 1976 from Gateway College of Evangelism, St. Louis, Missouri, and a Master of Science in Education from Southern Illinois University in 1978. Of the 11,267 United Pentecostal Church International ministers in North America, she was the oldest at the time of her passing. She served with distinction as an Elder at the 1st United Pentecostal Church of Augusta for the past 20 years. She was a gifted songwriter and vocalist and recorded two projects. She loved everyone and everyone loved her. Most of all, she loved Jesus and was 100% Apostolic.

Edith was predeceased by her husband Resal T. Stoops, four sisters (Virginia Rutledge Sipes, Irene Rutledge Painter, Ina Rutledge Bell, Eunilah Rutledge Mean), two brothers Vivion Rutledge, Darrel "Gene" Rutledge; and a granddaughter Stacey Stoops Penrod. EDITH RUTLEDGE STOOPS – A SOLDIER IS AT REST

My mother, Edith Rutledge Stoops was a stalwart soldier of Jesus Christ. Everywhere she went people were drawn to her because of the anointing that was upon her and because she made people feel important and loved. She was a fearless witness wherever she went. It was her practice to witness just about every time she went out.

There are many who remember her as their favorite Sunday School teacher. She devoted herself to serving Jesus Christ. She ministered in countless nursing home services. She took me with her. She ministered in the state prison with her friend, Reverend Audrey Feigl, who she had helped win to the Lord. She helped start churches. She cleaned the church. She made peanut brittle (much to my chagrin as the world's worst peanut brittle sales-boy). She sang and wrote many songs that brought hope to many. She was used in the Gifts of the Spirit for as long as I can remember. In one particular service she gave a message in tongues and there was no interpretation given. Mom began to worry that perhaps she had missed it but after the service a friend told her, "Sister Stoops, I brought a guest with me tonight and he is very angry with you." My mother was startled and asked why the guest would be angry with her. Sister Sharon Wells replied that her guest was visiting from the nation of Lebanon and had told her, "That woman is not fooling me. She is speaking to me in perfect Arabic." I do not know what God said to this man, for he stormed out after God spoke directly to him through my mother.

Our little home missions church was having a revival and mother went to tidy the building up before the evening service. While there, she noticed the toilet was continually running so after jiggling the handle, she looked inside the holding tank and found a fifth of whiskey sitting in the cold water. Mom poured it out and got rid of the bottle. A man had been coming to the revival services seeking the Holy Ghost. We noticed that each night he would make a trip to the bathroom before going to the altar. He had not been able to receive the Holy Ghost. That night when the preacher gave the altar call, he got up, went to the bathroom, came out, and walked to the altar and received the Holy Ghost. Nice job Mom!

There are many pastors who she helped to mentor (including me). Mother was a prayer

warrior/altar worker. She prayed countless people through to the Holy Ghost. There was no job she wouldn't tackle. Her name was never on a church sign, she just served...knocking doors, teaching home Bible studies, encouraging the saints, encouraging the ministry, literally fulfilling Eccl 9:10. "Whatsoever thy hand findeth to do, do it with thy might; for there is no work, nor device, nor knowledge, nor wisdom, in the grave, whither thou goest."

I would be remiss if I did not share how mother was introduced to the Apostolic faith. My father, Resal Stoops, invited mother and her family to attend a revival that was taking place in White Hall, Illinois.

The year was 1938. Rev. Charles Rigdon was the pastor. Sister Ruby Layle was the evangelist. My father explained, "I believe they are 'Jesus-only' but that's all right, they believe in getting the Holy Ghost, and I want to receive the Holy Ghost." So off they went, filling up a Model A front seat and rumble seat. That first night my Dad and my Mom's sister, Eunilah Rutledge, were both filled. Shortly thereafter, Eunilah felt the call to preach and became a well-known evangelist. Sister Charlotte, a former Catholic Nun of the Carmelite order, was baptized in Jesus name and filled with the Holy Ghost and began traveling with Eunilah. Sister Charlotte would give a portion of her testimony and Sis Eunilah would play the piano, sing, and preach in each meeting. They preached the first camp meeting in Old Town, Maine. When Sister Eunilah and Sister Charlotte were ministering in the bayous of Louisiana, a man standing in a pool hall said, "I think I'll go hear that nun give her testimony." He did and was gloriously filled with the Holy Ghost and baptized in the name of Jesus. That man's name was Tom Fred Tenney, who would go on to become the General Foreign Missions Director, Louisiana District Superintendent, etc. My father never preached behind a pulpit but he made one invitation that literally changed the world. There are thousands in the Kingdom of God today because of that one single invitation.

Dad got us into the Church. Mom kept us in the church. Mom never gave us the option of staying home from church while we were living at home. My family and many more are in the church today because of her faithfulness. She exemplified what "God first" means. I shall always thank God for my precious mother, Edith Rutledge Stoops!

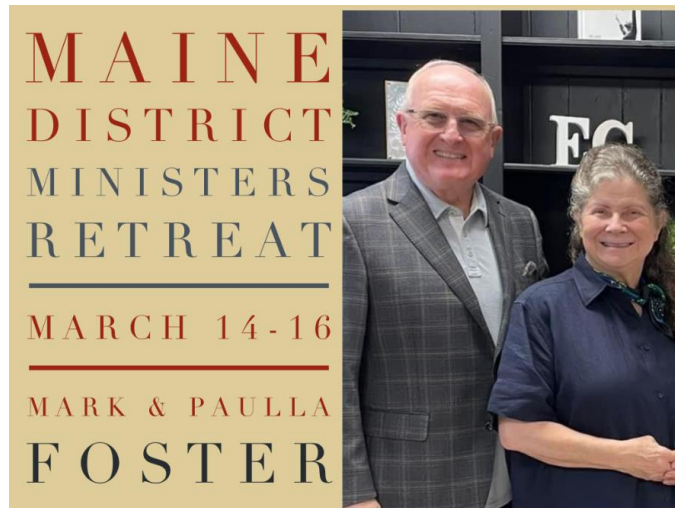


MAINE DISTRICT MINISTERS RETREAT
